Working in partnership with the Shaw Festival, students receive direct feedback from professionals, who help the students hone their auditioning skills. This innovative event is unique in that it challenges theatre professionals, teachers and students to work together, promoting creative thinking skills in a collaborative, co-operative environment.

Congratulations also to Mackenna Louks from Welland Centennial Secondary School for being selected to receive the 2nd place prize. The quality of work at the competition was outstanding.

Congratulations, Sir Winston Churchill Bulldog Cross Country Running Team!

The Sir Winston Churchill Bulldog cross country running team has achieved amazing success this year, adding yet another chapter to the program's remarkable history.

Over the past 25 years, the Bulldogs have dominated the Southern Ontario Secondary Athletic Association (SOSSA) which is comprised of 55 high schools stretching from Hamilton to Fort Erie. This year, the team won two of the three age divisions in both the girls and boys competitions and won the overall girls, boys, and team categories at SOSSA.

Sir Winston Churchill then sent 24 athletes to compete against the other 18 athletic associations across Ontario at the Ontario Federation of School Athletic Associations (OFSAA) meet in Collingwood on November 7. At this year's OFSAA competition, the Bulldogs' midget girls finished tied for 5th, the midget boys' team reached the podium winning a bronze medallion and the senior boys' team won a silver medallion, narrowly missing the gold by a slim 5 point margin. The boys' team was 2nd overall in Ontario in spite of not fielding a team in the junior age category. Last year the Bulldogs' junior boys' team won the gold medal and Sir Winston also won the overall boys provincial title. These student athletes succeed because of their natural talent, unrelenting work ethic, and commitment to the team.

The Bulldog cross country running jacket is a symbol of excellence; it is revered by competitors and respected by coaches across Ontario. The Bulldogs have come to know that wearing this jacket while representing Sir Winston Churchill is an incredible honour.

The coaches, parents, and staff want the student athletes to know that they are extremely proud of them and their accomplishments. The team's efforts truly embody Sir Winston Churchill's motto: "Facta Non Verba", which when translated means, "Deeds, not words."

<u>Director's Recognition for Extraordinary Contributions – Benny Ralston, Volunteer Cross Country Running Coach, Sir Winston Churchill Secondary School</u>

One way that the DSBN measures success is by studying performance data. If one examines the data for cross country running in Ontario, they will find a consistent pattern of success for the Sir Winston Churchill Bulldogs.

Over the past 25 years, the Bulldogs have won 13 OFSAA championships and many more silver and bronze medallions. OFSAA is the second largest high school athletic association in all of North America and is comprised of 860 high schools. Unlike other team sports such as basketball or volleyball, OFSAA cross country does not have separate competitions for different sized schools. This means that Sir Winston Churchill competes directly against many schools that have much larger student populations. Remarkably, Sir Winston Churchill has won more OFSAA championships for schools that enter both boys and girls teams over the past 25 years than any other school in the province!

So what has made Sir Winston Churchill cross country running so successful? The question isn't a what? Rather, it's who?

Ask any student at the school and they will tell you that it's **Coach Benny Ralston** who is the tireless engine that drives their cross country team on to victory. Benny is deserving of the Director's Recognition for Extraordinary Contribution because for over 20 years he has channeled his energy to positively change the lives of hundreds of students who have run under his leadership.

Benny creates a culture of team success through encouragement, shared leadership, and inclusion. He takes a personal interest in every one of his runners and differentiates their training. Benny spends countless hours building up students and speaking to parents about their child's progress. Benny expects students to take on leadership roles and his athletes never disappoint. At any competition, you will see and hear the team warming each other up, giving impromptu pep talks, carrying equipment for one another, and lining the course to cheer on every single runner until the last Bulldog crosses the finish line. This is the Bulldog way and everyone involved appreciates the warm sense of team and family Benny has created.

Benny is a coach who wears his emotions on his sleeve; everyone who knows him will tell you he loves to win and that the disappointment from falling short is sometimes hard to hide; but there is something else that Benny wears on his sleeve... in fact, on the sleeve of every Bulldog hoodie or long sleeve T-shirt, you will see a printed running record of all the past OFSAA championships that his teams have won. This list of championship years serves as a constant reminder of the Bulldog legacy and motivates athletes to earn their place as part of this winning tradition.

Benny Ralston epitomizes what is means to be dedicated and disciplined. A former two time OFSAA cross country champion himself, he has unselfishly volunteered thousands of hours to share his passion for running. Benny leaves his own store each day in order to coach athletes at Sir Winston night after night and also on the weekends. He and his dog Wookie, follow athletes on their city and country running routes, coaching, encouraging, hydrating, and challenging students to go faster and farther. What people may not know is that training for cross country doesn't just end in November. After a two week break, Benny begins training his runners for indoor and outdoor track all winter, spring, and summer. When Benny says, "Run!" he means it!

Cross country athletes run through some awful weather conditions. But every now and then they get an unexpected patch of nice weather... Benny likes to attribute these times of good fortune to something he likes to call, "Benny Magic." However, the real "Benny Magic" is helping kids to discover the mental and physical strength that they never knew they possessed. Benny sees potential in everyone!

Thank you Benny for your 20 years of unwavering commitment. You inspire people to dream and achieve their goals, not just in running, but in life!
