Grade 3s Learn How to Swim to Survive





The Education Foundation of Niagara was successful with a grant from the Lifesaving Society and the YMCA of Niagara where over \$15,000 covered pool fees, paid for instructors and the transportation costs for 450 grade three children from Niagara Region's high priority schools.

Delivering this programming to high need schools is important as many students do not have access to these types of programs nor the funding available to pay. Students received in-water sessions at local YMCAs with focus on being able to roll into deep water, tread water for one minute and swim for 50 metres. The sessions are not meant to replace standard swimming lessons, but provide the minimum standard for surviving a fall into deep water. "Kids are swimming all across the Region and very few have the necessary skills to survive a water tragedy", says Tom Reynolds, Crystal Beach Public School Principal.

The Lifesaving Society, Canada's life guarding experts, is a charitable organization working to prevent drowning and water-related injury through its training programs, Water Smart® public education and safety management services.

Upon completion of the program it was noted that many and sometime most students did not have skills needed to keep safe in water. We hope this program will make our region a little safer.

Corporate Funding...Helping Schools

The EFN focus in 2010 has been strengthening community partnerships, enhancing special events and achieving support from corporate donors that will directly impact innovative school project needs. Over \$80,000 has been granted from a variety of corporate funders in areas of environmental education, healthy active lifestyles and water safety, for example.

Recess Revival...Westmount and Ross Schools

Through a coordinated effort between the Education Foundation of Niagara and the DSBN, the Recess Revival program supports an increase in physical activity during student free time at recess, lunch and after school. In addition, the Canadian Intramural Recreation Association (CIRA) is on board by providing workshops to the Recess Revival groups. "The main outcomes are leading a wide variety of game experiences, and engaging all students in inclusive games", says John Byl, President of CIRA Ontario. Funds provided for this program will be used to purchase game and sport items that will give students, student leaders and teachers a wide range of resources to create fun and unique games so that instead of being idle at recess and during lunch hours, boys and girls will become more involved in games of skill, balance and agility.

Westmount Public School is able to run the program due to a generous grant from BMO Employee Charitable Foundation.

Nutrition Is the Mission .at Queen Mary



The Niagara Community Foundation supported Queen Mary Public School with the purchase of an industrial toaster at their highly visited breakfast program. The consistent message from our school administrators is that providing students nutrition programs significantly improves their cognitive or mental abilities, enabling them to be more alert, pay better attention, and to do better in terms of reading, math and other standardized test scores. Children getting breakfast at school are sick less often, have fewer problems associated with hunger, such as dizziness, lethargy, stomach-aches and ear aches, and do significantly better. Student nutrition programs not only help to feed the hungry and increase educational performance, but it's also an opportunity to educate the students in nutritional practices, build social skills and encourage environmental practices.

RBC Foundation Steps up with Donation of Shoe Vouchers for 100 Kids in Need



The RBC Foundation has generously donated \$4,000.00 to the poverty initiative created and administered by the Education Foundation of Niagara to District School Board of Niagara students in need. Public school students and teachers came together this spring to form ECO-Teams whose main focus are to get kids out of school and into an outdoor learning classroom built around nature. ECO groups were formed made up of eager students and dedicated staff to turn unused greenspace into another place to study and learn using trees, plants, rocks and other natural supplies. "On days when the weather is nice, students in all areas of curriculum can relocate to the outdoor venue", says Allison Toews-Peplinski, from Prince of Wales North.

The Education Foundation of Niagara has assisted the three schools with achieving funding from a variety of sources making this a community effort. "What a wonderful collaborative effort this is that helps to meet the environmental challenges we are all facing", says Mel Groom, Board Chair of Niagara Community Foundation.

Now that the plans are complete and the funding has been awarded, official plant dates will be determined where the ECO teams, the school and the general community will work together to create the space. And for all their hard work, ECO teams are rewarded with their own personal tour of the Butterfly Conservatory at the end of the year. "Connecting curriculum with the environment is easy to do in this outdoor classroom and we are very pleased to have the opportunity to support this innovative learning opportunity", says Gary Lowes, President of Teachers Credit Union.

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
